NCEA Updates

On Thursday 9 September, the Government announced further changes



to NCEA for this year's students. For students disrupted by 16 days of alert level restrictions this year the following will apply:

Learning Recognition Credits (LRCs)

- for every five credits a student earns, they get one extra LRC
- students at NCEA Level 1 are eligible for up to eight additional credits
- students at NCEA Levels 2 or 3 are eligible for up to six additional credits

Endorsements – no change to normal requirements

University Entrance – no change to normal requirements

Where the changes to the examination timetable have resulted in a clash between an examination and an existing commitment you can arrange to sit your examination at another school examination centre. Please see Mrs Sewell for this process. If this does not work, you can apply for pre-approval for a derived grade. Pre-approval for derived grade

However, senior students who are deemed at risk of not passing Level 1, 2 or 3 this year can expect an email or a phone call, from either their subject teacher or Dean in Week 9. 

Classwize

At Sacred Heart College we are trialling a new tool for teachers called *Classwize*.





engagement, and help reduce distractions during learning time. The tool also filters out inappropriate and unacceptable Internet traffic.

The *Classwize* dashboard can see screenshots of what a student is working on in real time and the browser tabs that are open. Teachers can open appropriate websites for topic-based content, reduce distractions by focusing classes or students on specific websites, and even pause the Internet to allow for class discussion and interaction. This tool will also be used to monitor students while completing digital exams, a system currently used by NZQA. We see *Classwize* as an essential tool to support your daughter's use of the Internet on their digital journey, and we hope you do
