Year 10 Social Studies

Year 10 Social Studies classes walked down to the Dowse Art Museum during August/ September to visit Nuku Tewhatewha as part of their studies of the Kīngitanga Movement. Built in 1856 by Wiremu Tako Ngātata (Te Āti Awa, Ngāti Ruanui, Ngā Ruahinerangi, Ngā Iwi o Taranaki) it is the only survivor of eight pātaka constructed in support of the

Kīngitanga. A Pākehā family, the Beethams cared for Nuku Tewhatewha for 120 years after Ngātata leased his land to his friend, William Beetham on the condition he cared for Nuku Tewhatewha. In 1982 Nuku Tewhatewha was returned to Te Awakairangi and into the care of the Dowse with the blessing of Te Te Āti Awa. It is a significant national taonga for students to explore in terms of unity, peace, resistance, struggle and partnership. *Mrs Anna Peszynski, HOD Social Sciences*

We are getting a new data base which will be going live by the end of the year. This will include a Parent Portal at some stage, which will mean parents can log in and see their account balance and manage their account details. This secure self-service platform will also allow you to make payments. Watch this space!

If you are paying by regular instalments your account should be paid by the end of November, or by payment plan as agreed by us. It is preferable to have a regular instalment that keeps your account in hand.

Financial assistance is available to families experiencing financial hardship (loss of income/redundancy, family reasons, etc). It is a condition of the assistance application that the family has an affordable regular payment in place. You apply for this assistance with the school.

As part of our international programme, we have a group of students from Shibuya Makuhari High School in Tokyo, Japan coming to visit us from 8-20 March 2024. Shibuya Makuhari has been visiting SHC for a number of years now, and they love coming to our school.

We are currently looking for host families, who have a child attending SHC next year. We would like to place one international student per family.

The Homestay Fee is \$310 per week. You will need to provide the student with their own bedroom (if available), or, they can share a bedroom with your own child. They must sleep in their own bed which has adequate linen and bedding. A trundler bed or bunk bed is also suitable, however a mattress placed on the floor will

Mana Ora Trophy - SHC vs SBC Water Polo Donated by Mikalah Hall

Fundraising helps cancer patients and their whānau get the care and practical support they need and helps protect future generations of New Zealanders by helping to fund ground-breaking cancer research and vital prevention programmes.
