#### Attendance

As you are aware, the Ministry of Education collects our attendance data daily. One challenge with their reporting is that they define "Present" as being physically in front of a teacher in a classroom. This definition does not account for students who are present and actively involved in learning experiences outside of the classroom.

For Term 1, 2025, our classroom attendance was 68%. However, when considering students engaged in educational programmes, whether in class, on a course, or participating in outdoor activities like mountain biking, our attendance was 91%. This is fantastic news, as both statistics have returned to pre-COVID rates.

#### Year 13 Tourism Trip - Rotorua

On our Rotorua trip, we learned a lot about the local culture and the history of tourism in Rotorua. We visited Te Puia, where we saw bubbling mud pools and powerful geysers. Our tour guide Patrick taught us a lot about Māori traditions and showed us the process of carving and weaving, providing us with a deeper knowledge of Māori culture. At Skyline Luge, we rode the luge tracks and witnessed the amazing views from the top of the hill. At the Rotorua Museum, we were enriched with knowledge of tourism in Rotorua and the history of prominent Rotorua landmarks, like Mt Tarawera and the impacts

that the eruption had on Rotorua and its environment. On our way back home, we visited the Aratiatia Rapids where we watched the dam open, watching thousands of litres of water rush back into the Waikato River. The trip was an amazing and memorable experience that taught us a lot of new things and let us explore the nature and culture of Rotorua.


